




## **BROKEN** Directed by Rufus Norris

Winning a BIFA for 'best independent British film', *Broken* focuses on three differing families residing in a south London cul-de-sac unwillingly brought together and emotionally torn apart after a violent attack within the neighbourhood.

It is based on the 2008 novel of the same name written by Daniel Clay, which was partly inspired by *To Kill a Mockingbird*.

As a result one of the bags of the life changing sums of money is misplaced and enters the hands of a vulnerable 7-year-old boy whose honourable intentions generates attention from unwanted company. The film stars Alex Etel, Lewis Owen McGibbon and James Nesbitt.

Based on the screenwriter Frank Cottrell Boyce's children's book of the same name, this is a rare movie that has equal appeal for kids and adults.



## **PRIDE** Directed by Matthew Warchus *Part of Deal Festival*

This film is inspired by an extraordinary true story. It's the summer of 1984, Margaret Thatcher is in power and the National Union of Mineworkers is on strike, prompting a London-based group of gay and lesbian activists to raise money to support the strikers' families.

Initially rebuffed by the Union, the group identifies a tiny mining village in Wales and sets off to make their donation in person. As the strike drags on, the two groups discover that standing together makes for the strongest union of all.
